security: safety

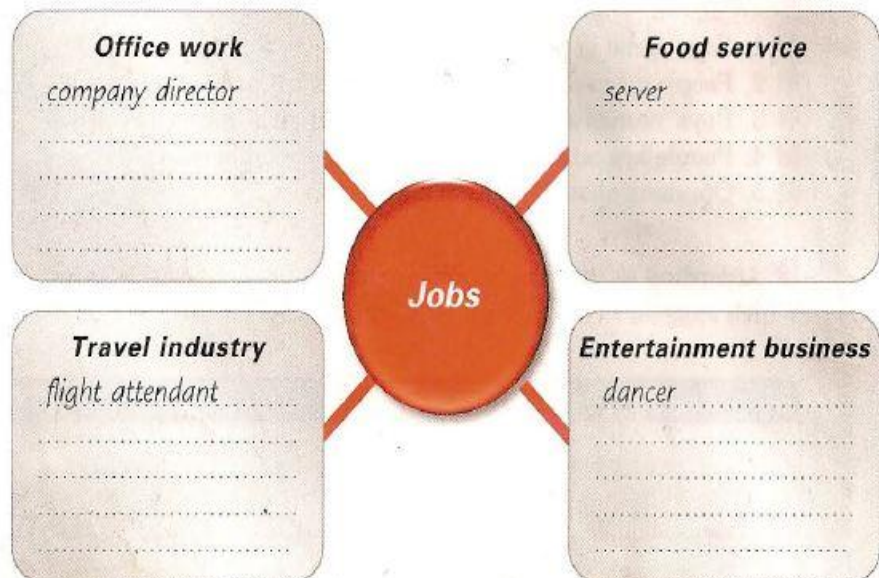
dangerous: not safe

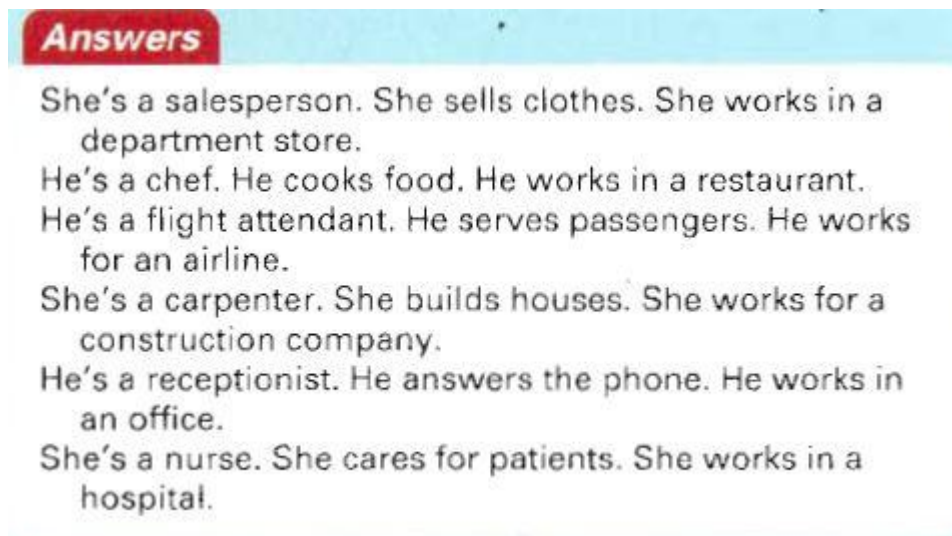
Then you have to match the information in columns A, B, and C.

Conversation section

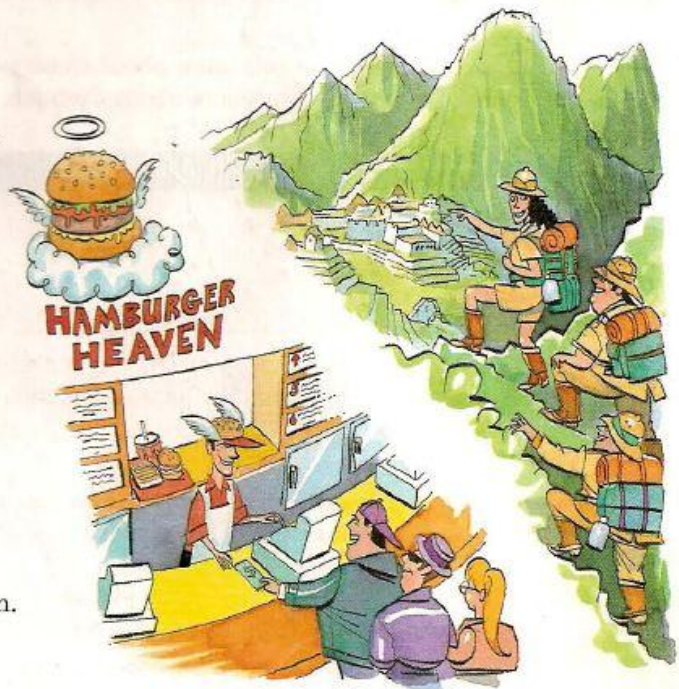
In this section we will practice a conversation about jobs; pay attention to simple present Wh-questions and statements in context.

In the following conversation, Jason and Andrea are talking about their jobs. Focus on the pictures.

4 CONVERSATION *Where do you work?*

A Listen and practice.

- Jason: Where do you work, Andrea?
Andrea: I work at Thomas Cook Travel.
Jason: Oh, really? What do you do there?
Andrea: I'm a guide. I take people on tours to countries in South America, like Peru.
Jason: How interesting!
Andrea: Yes, it's a great job. I love it. And what do you do?
Jason: I'm a student, and I have a part-time job, too.
Andrea: Oh? Where do you work?
Jason: In a fast-food restaurant.
Andrea: Which restaurant?
Jason: Hamburger Heaven.

5 GRAMMAR FOCUS

Simple present Wh-questions and statements

What do you do?	I'm a student, and I have a part-time job.	I/You	He/She
Where do you work?	I work at/in a restaurant.	work	works
Where do you go to school?	I go to the University of Texas.	take	takes
Where does Andrea work?	She works at Thomas Cook Travel.	study	studies
What does she do?	She's a guide. She takes people on tours.	teach	teaches
How does she like it?	She loves it.	do	does
		go	goes
		have	has

Present simple

Positive: S (I, we, you, they) + V1 **I work at Thomas Cook Travel**
S (he, she, it) + Vs **She works at Thomas Cook Travel**

Negative: S (I, we, you, they) + do + not + V1 **They don't like their job**
S (he, she, it) + does + not + V1 **She doesn't love her job**

Question: Do / Does + S + V1 + ? **Where do you work, Andrea?**

We use the present simple to:

1. Talk about daily routines and habits.
2. Talk about facts.

Now, go back to the conversation on page 9 and try to find TWO questions with the word **do** in part A and TWO questions about Jason in part B.

1	2	3	4	5
Where	do	you	work,	Andrea?
What	do	you	do	there?
What	does	Jason	do,	exactly?
How	does	he	like	his job?

Thus, the rule for forming wh-questions in the simple present:

Wh-word + do/does + subject + verb?

Now, try to do the following exercise:
